WVU Jackson's Mill Summer Season Begins a Week Early

The summer season will be kicking off a week early this year, thanks to an international museum conference being hosted by the Farmstead at WVU Jackson's Mill. ALHFAM, the Association for Living History, Farm and Agricultural Museums, will hold its annual meeting June 4-8, making it the first large group of the summer.

ALHFAM is making its first trip to West Virginia primarily because of the efforts of Dean Hardman, Program Specialist for the Heritage Education. "ALHFAM usually picks well-known historic sites like Colonial Williamsburg, VA, Old Sturbridge, MA, or Old Salem, NC for their conferences," Hardman said. "But since a majority of the

membership is small to medium sized sites, I didn't see why we couldn't be selected; Jackson's Mill has plenty to offer – including some things you can't get at the big sites." After holding a board of directors meeting at the

The crowd always seems to appreciate our entry, but this year the judges honored us for our participation in the annual event. It is no surprise that the festival crowd is filled with many strong 4-H supporters and alumni, but we like to think that we were doing more than lengthening the lineup.

They may be spectators at an organized festival or surprised neighbors sitting on the porches that



contain a side road, but when people see our unmistakable jerseys, they take notice. A 4-H alumna will relive the happy memories of her childhood. A local community leader is reminded of why he continues to serve. A young parent may be impressed by this innovative event that is available to 4-H members. Outspoken engages the people of West Virginia in a way that even camps and fairs cannot; and all this has been made possible through the strong support of the 4-H volunteers, members, agents, and All Stars from West Virginia.

We are still planning the details of a new route for 2011, but I can tell you that the dates will be June 16 - 19. The riders will cross through the counties of Mercer, Summers, Monroe, Greenbrier, Pocahontas, Randolph, Upshur, and Lewis as they roll into another exciting year of state 4-H camps. I also want you to know that the Outspoken for 4-H riders are taking on a new cause this year. Our riders are always looking ahead, and we know that a strong foundation in the sciences is important for our future. In 2011, \$5,000 of the funds we raise will directly support scholarships for members who attend technology camp during Alpha at Jackson's Mill. In addition, these funds will be matched by a private family foundation. We are excited about this new opportunity, and we hope that you will help us support

Mill, the board members agreed.

So far, response to meeting at the Mill has been positive. Over sixty workshops and preconference sessions were proposed. The Mill's varied facilities mean it was possible to accommodate everything from classic presentations using PowerPoint to hands-on activities such as a plowing contest, mowing grass with a scythe, outdoor cooking, and learning to run a water-powered gristmill. The new multipurpose arena will see some action too: there are several sessions planned that will use horses.

Participants will also learn a little about 4-H during the visit. A traditional Council Circle is planned for the last night of the conference. There is also a workshop about a program based on a cooperative arrangement in Glenview, IL, between Wagner Farm and the Glenview Clovers 4-H Club.

The Farmstead at WVU Jackson's Mill put in the bid to host the 2011 meeting in 2009. Between 200 and 300 participants from across the United States and Canada, as well as from Europe, are expected to attend.

Youths Like Jennifer Friend Can Benefit from Livestock Program Funds Such As Those Jean Woloshuk Supports

When longtime WVU Extension Service 4-H Specialist Jean Woloshuk passes, she's ensured that the 4-H program she has nurtured over the last 34 years will remain strong.

Woloshuk recently became a member of the WVU Foundation's Irvin Stewart Society, which recognizes those who have provided for a WVU program in their wills, created gifts that provide retirement income, designated retirement assets for after-death gifts, donated life insurance policies, made certain accounts "payable on death," or contributed real estate while retaining all lifetime rights to the property.

The John & Frances Woloshuk/Richard & Bernadine Niedermeyer 4-H Agricultural Program Endowment (3V627), which she established as a tribute to her parents and relatives for encouraging her to do her best and help others, will receive additional funding upon her death.

"My bequest will help support 4-H agricultural judging events and shooting sports, especially chaperones who accompany teams to these national 4-H competitions. These national experiences are a positive youth development activity -- not just the competitive event but the entire trip. This is a means to assist the counties in having adequate and appropriate adult supervision for these endeavors," said Woloshuk.

The John & Frances Woloshuk/Richard & Bernadine Niedermeyer 4-H Agricultural Program Endowment was established to support 4-H agricultural judging events and shooting sports, as well as chaperones who accompany teams to national 4-H competitions.

While Woloshuk was not a 4-H'er, she was able to experience the "learn by doing" 4-H motto and its positive impact on youth as an Extension agent in Wetzel and Monongalia counties, where she started her career.

"I worked with 4-H horse teams and took youth to national competitions two times. This experience was not only a positive growing experience for the youth but also for me," said Woloshuk.

Through 4-H, Woloshuk has had the opportunity to meet and work with many 4-H families throughout the years.

"It's wonderful seeing youth I worked with in the county programs who now have kids in the program. Watching the youth grow and mature is great, and when you see their accomplishments as they progress not only



through the 4-H program but life, you get a feeling of 'wow,'" Woloshuk said. Woloshuk encourages others to establish endowments if they are capable and have a passion for a particular program or to give to existing programs that meet their interests.

"I hope the impact of this gift will be here a long time to support 4-H youth agricultural programming," Woloshuk said. "I've had wonderful colleagues who helped me conduct programs, and we want youth and adults to know the impact of agriculture on their lives."

Teamwork and giving back have always been a part of Larry and Margaret Brown's lives. The couple married in 1965, and, as a team, have been in the solid waste and recycling business since 1979. They currently own Weston Transfer Inc., with its office located in Weston, and Jack's Septic Service, Inc., with its office located in Glenville.

As a 4-H club member in Harrison County, Margaret learned a great deal about teamwork and service. And it was the knowledge that 4-H instills those values in youth that helped her and her husband decide to develop an endowment to help Lewis County 4-H'ers.

"We wanted to do something special for Lewis County 4-H," Margaret said. "After meeting with Julie (Cryser, WVU Extension Service development director) and discussing how the endowment program would benefit the 4-H organization, we decided it was a great opportunity to help 4-H in Lewis County."

The Browns established the Larry D. and Margaret D. Brown Lewis County 4-H Endowment. The fund will provide support for the 4-H program in Lewis County, including but not limited to county, state, and national camp scholarships, volunteer leader travel, the purchase of supplies, and general expenses.

Jefferson County 4-H'ers Will Benefit From a New Endowment Created Through the WVU Foundation

The Jefferson County 4-H Foundation recently established the second largest county 4-H endowment in the history of the West Virginia University Foundation, creating a legacy that will benefit the youth development program in the county for years to come.

"After 30 years of the founding of our Jefferson County 4-H Foundation it was time to explore additional avenues of investments, fundraising opportunities, and a way to help with the future operation of our foundation, which has been done by volunteers since 1979. A partnership with the WVU Foundation is a logical choice for our future."

Jefferson County 4-H Foundation members felt that it was a good time to create an endowment to ensure future support of the 4-H program in the county. The WVU Extension Service Development Office will work with the county to provide fundraising support, including soliciting gifts and helping with direct mail fundraisers, among other services.

The Jefferson County 4-H Foundation Endowment also marks the fourth county endowment specifically tailored to 4-H organizations that allows "spend," the cash generated from the endowment, to be disbursed to the organization in one lump sum each year in July. "The annual payout from these funds goes directly to the county 4-H programs to support their 4-H'ers," said David E. Miller, WVU associate provost and WVU Extension Service director. "The WVU Extension Service Development Office can then help to raise dollars to add to those accounts and, in turn, to the funding to



support the county 4-H programs."

"The WVU Extension Service County 4-H Endowment Program is aimed at growing the number of counties that have discretionary funds, providing a new or diversified funding stream for 4-H programs on the most local of local levels," said Julie R. Cryser, WVU Extension Service development director.

"When a county has an endowment through the WVU Foundation, we are able to ask donors to support that endowment when we make face-to-face visits, through our annual fund call-a-thon, and through our direct mail campaigns," Cryser said. "At the end of the day, this means additional scholarships for county and state camps, additional funding for travel, and support for the county 4-H programs overall."

Jeremy Horvat, the Jefferson County WVU Extension 4-H agent, worked with the foundation and the WVU Extension Service Development Office to facilitate meetings and discussion about the endowment process.

"The possibilities of collaboration between the Jefferson County 4-H Foundation and the WVU Extension Service Development Office are very exciting," Horvat said. "Additional collaboration on donor identification and additional fundraising avenues will benefit the 4-H program in the county over the long term."

The WVU Foundation is a private nonprofit corporation that was chartered in 1954 to secure, hold, and administer funds and properties by individuals, corporations, and philanthropic foundations in support of West Virginia University and its affiliated organizations.

"With our endowment, our local 4-H club will have funds to participate in events that might not otherwise be possible," she said.

Giving back to their community has always been a priority for the Browns. They spend many hours volunteering and take active leadership roles in the community. In 1998, Margaret received the Lewis County Chamber of Commerce's highest honor, the Lewis Countian of the Year award. Larry and Margaret are Paul Harris Fellows in Rotary.

The Browns have also established the Larry and Margaret Brown Scholarship Fund for students who are graduating from high school and who are residents

of Lewis, Gilmer, Braxton, Upshur, Harrison, Randolph, and Ritchie counties to attend Glenville State.

The Browns utilized state Neighborhood Investment Program tax credits to establish their Lewis County 4-H endowment. Businesses and individuals who contribute to any of the programs covered are eligible to receive up to 50 percent of the contributed amount in the form of state tax credits. Donors may use the credits to reduce liability for the corporate net income tax, the business franchise tax, or the personal income tax. The Browns' gift was made through the WVU Foundation, a private nonprofit corporation that generates and provides support for West Virginia University.
