

WVU Extension Dean Committed To Making the Best Better

Nearly one year ago Jorge Atiles embarked on a new journey as WVU's Dean of Extension and Engagement. After visiting the WVU campus in spring of 2020, he immediately fell in love with the people and the beauty of the state. But more importantly, he was impressed by the work of WVU Extension Service, including the programs and outreach geared toward West Virginia youths.

Although the past year has presented a number of challenges, Dean Atiles is proud of and encouraged by the phenomenal work of Extension's faculty, staff, volunteers and others who helped us not only navigate the pandemic, but also strengthened our ability to reach people when they needed us most. He noted that the pandemic provided unique opportunities for WVU Extension to look at how we deliver programming – something that he hopes to build on moving forward.

"I certainly look forward to returning to a new sense of normalcy in the coming year. I enjoy meeting people and learning more about how Extension has changed their lives. That interaction is critical to the work we do," Dean Atiles said. "The pandemic also forced us to look at how we deliver programming to the citizens of the state. Having a blend of in-person and virtual activities allows us to expand our reach to truly 'meet people where they are' and how they want to be reached."

Although much of Dean Atiles' interactions have been done over Zoom or other virtual formats, his presence can be felt across the WVU campus (and state) where he has been busy forging relationships and identifying opportunities for collaboration to help West Virginia. He feels passionate

about helping young people learn the skills they need to succeed, including programming focused on entrepreneurship, leadership and 21st century skills. He also knows that Extension plays a critical role in community development, including opportunities to enhance tourism around the state.

"The resources and expertise we have available through partnerships at WVU are critical to the work we do to carry out our land-grant mission," he said. "There are so many opportunities for unique collaborations that provide knowledge and research to our citizens to improve their livelihoods. We can do so much more when we work together, and I am committed to ensuring that not only do the people of West Virginia have those resources, but that WVU Extension also has the support our faculty and staff need in those communities."

During a recent question and answer session, Dean Atiles responded to the following questions: What are you

looking forward to in the coming year? "Getting out and meeting people face-to-face is at the top of my list. WVU Extension has an outstanding community of volunteers and leaders who help make our programs successful. Our faculty and staff do so much and having such a dedicated group of people who make sure we 'make the best better' makes me very grateful. I really look forward to being able to thank them in person for all they do for us." Why is 4-H important, particularly to West Virginia youths? "It prepares them to succeed. It allows them to discover something new about themselves and the potential they have to learn and be amazing citizens of West Virginia and the world." Your vision for the future of WVU Extension Service? "To address the most critical issues affecting the state and to reach every single West Virginian with educational programs that allow them to live well and improve their livelihoods."

A native of the Dominican Republic, Dean Atiles earned a bachelor's degree from the Universidad Nacional Pedro Henriquez Urena, Dominican Republic, and his master's degree and PhD from Virginia Tech. Before joining WVU, he was associate dean for Extension, engagement and continuing education for the Colleges of Education, Health. Aviation and Human Sciences at Oklahoma State University. Prior to his role at OSU, he served as associate dean for Outreach and Extension the University of Georgia.

TAYLOR COUNTY

All Star Rose Garden—Reimagined!

Created in the 1960's, the Rose Garden at Jackson's Mill was planted to provide roses for the 4-H All Star initiation ceremonies each year. In 1975, an endowment was established with the WVU Foundation by Harrison Co. 4-H All Star James V Morris to provide ongoing maintenance and care for the garden. Known from that point as the James V. Morris All Star Rose Garden, it was originally placed behind Calhoun Cottage, but moved to its current location behind Gilmer Cottage, in 1980, to allow the roses to flourish in full sunlight.

Cared for, for many years, by Mill staff and a host of All Star volunteers, the garden has gone through many phases of transition in its nearly sixty years of existence. Having fallen into disrepair and showing signs of damage from wildlife, a shelter was erected in 1999 by the Berkeley Co. 4-H All Stars to protect the roses. However, with the best of intensions

comes great responsibility and with dwindling staff and volunteer assistance, the Rose Garden faced many challenges in the decades since, namely deteriorated fencing and horticulture related issues with the rose bushes which prevented their continued growth.

With ample funding available through the Morris Endowment, a multi-year collaboration was started in 2015 to develop a plan for the complete renovation of the garden. Spearheaded by Kristi Gannon, President of the Lewis Co. All Stars, a group of volunteers, including retired Harrison Co. Ag. Agent, Larry Campbell, and Emeritus WVU Extension Service Horticulture Specialist, John Jett, worked together on the redesign to include the planting of new roses and installation of a new fence structure. The work was performed by Chuck Greaver, a Lewis Co. Contractor, and was completed in Fall 2019.
